SAFARI OVERVIEW

Explore the highlights of the Northern Territory and northern Queensland, including the Great Barrier Reef! In the Northern Territory, you'll watch the sunset and sunrise transform Ayers Rock and Kata Tjuta. Explore Kings Canyon, Watarrka National Park, the richest botanical region in arid Australia, with an optional helicopter flight over the canyon (not included). Spend two days in Kakadu National Park with short walks, night spotting, aboriginal rock art, and a boat cruise on Yellow Waters Billabong. In northern Queensland, you'll spend two days at Atherton Tablelands to explore the tapestry of farmland, woodland, and rainforest, including another evening searching for mammals. Cruise the Daintree River early morning and then spend a day snorkeling the Great Barrier Reef. During this trip, you'll look for fabulous birds, several kangaroo species, various reptiles, and possibly platypus! We're excited to offer this trip in partnership with Inala Nature Tours owner, Australian biologist, and guide, Tonia Cochran. Join Tonia as she leads the group throughout these rich wildlife areas of Australia, assisted by some of the best resident naturalists in the region.

- Watch the landscape's colors transform during sunset at Ayers Rock and sunrise at Kata Tjuta.
- Explore Australia's famed national parks: Uluru, Watarrka, Kakadu, Crater Lakes, Mt. Hypipamee, and Curtain Fig.
- See a range of special mammals, birds, and plants from each area.
- Spend several nights looking for nocturnal mammals and other critters.
- Boat cruise the Yellow Waters Billabong and Daintree River.
- Snorkel the Great Barrier Reef.

DETAILED ITINERARY

Sep 18–19 ~ Travel to Uluru, Australia

Sep 20 ~ Arrive in Uluru and sunset at Ayers Rock

Arrive in Uluru, Australia (direct flights are available from most capital cities including Sydney and Melbourne and there are free transfers to the hotel). In the early afternoon, meet as a group in the foyer of the hotel for a briefing, before traveling to the famous Uluru (Ayers Rock). Watch the sunset change the remarkable monolith to spectacular and enjoy an Australian barbeque dinner. You will return to the hotel late in the evening.

Sep 21 ~ Sacred Kata Tjuta and Kings Canyon

This morning you will leave before sunrise and travel to Kata Tjuta (formerly known as the Olgas) to eat your picnic breakfast and watch the sunrise before taking a stroll around this cultural landmark. The remarkable

domed geological formations tower 1,500ft over the flat surrounding landscape. You will then travel to Kings Canyon in Watarrka National Park and settle into your cabins on arrival.

Sep 22 ~ Kings Canyon-Watarrka National Park

Spend the day exploring Kings Canyon and the Watarrka National Park today. The scenic landscape of rugged ranges, rock holes, and gorges act as a refuge for many plants and animals. With over 600 species of plants, Kings Canyon is botanically the richest region in arid Australia, making the park an important conservation area and a major attraction of central Australia. Kings Canyon features ancient sandstone walls sculpted by the elements over the millennia and rising 300ft to a plateau of rocky domes. There will be an opportunity to walk around the rim of the canyon and take some other shorter walks in the area, as well as the option of taking a helicopter flight over the canyon (not included).

Sep 23 ~ Drive to Alice Springs

Today will be mostly a day of travel towards Alice Springs with stops en route to explore the amazing Australian Outback scenery. One stop will include an area of waterholes off the Stuart Highway on the Hugh River. This fruitful area is usually home to a few patches of water and these, along with the fabled River Red Gums, attract a range of species. This is an excellent area for parrots, including Major Mitchell's cockatoo, little corella, budgerigar, galah, and cockatiel. Upon arrival in Alice Springs you will visit the local botanic gardens which is home to a multitude of resident birds including Australian ringneck parrot and western bowerbird (the male bowerbird is often seen around his bower trying to attract a mate). Euros and black-flanked rock wallaby can also be found here in the late afternoon. The hotel is situated on one side by the (usually dry) Todd River and on the other by a pedestrian mall where Indigenous art can be purchased.

Sep 24 ~ Fly to Darwin and Botanical Gardens

This morning after breakfast you will make your way to the airport for your flight to Darwin. Upon arrival, you will check into the hotel before spending the afternoon in the Botanical Gardens where you will enjoy your first views of the birds and flora of the area. Possibilities include red-collared lorikeet, orange-footed scrub-fowl, rose-crowned fruit-dove, little bronze-cuckoo, white-breasted woodswallow, magpie goose, Torresian imperial pigeon, rainbow bee-eater, sacred kingfisher, and brown honeyeater.

Sep 25 ~ Fogg Dam and South Alligator (Kakadu)

You will start the day with a visit to Fogg Dam. This well-known site is an excellent area for waterbirds including magpie goose, green pygmy-goose, pied heron, glossy ibis, the stately brolga, white-browed crane, and the quirky comb-crested jacana. En route to Kakadu you will enjoy a stop at the Adelaide River crossing for lunch where you may see mangrove golden whistler and a variety of flycatchers like shining, leaden, restless, and broad-billed flycatchers. On arrival in Kakadu you will enjoy a short walk to local lagoon to enjoy sunset. After dinner, you may enjoy some spotlighting for nocturnal species such as barking owl, tawny frogmouth, large-tailed nightjar, and Australian owl-nightjar.

Sep 26 ~ Mamukala Wetlands, Ubirr, Yellow Waters Billabong

This morning you will make a stop at the impressive Mamukala Wetlands where, if conditions are right, you can enjoy thousands of birds of many species. Plumed and wandering whistling ducks, radjah shelduck, black-necked Stork, magpie goose, and green pygmy-goose are possible bird highlights and file snakes and long-necked turtles can also be found here, a traditional hunting ground for the local indigenous people. There will also be an option to visit Ubirr, a site of rock outcrops in Kakadu that is home to some impressive aboriginal rock art. The art depicts creation ancestors and animals of the area, including several fish and turtle species, wallabies and possums. In the late afternoon, short-eared rock wallabies may be seen emerging from their shelters. Bird specialties found here include sandstone shrike-thrush, chestnut quilled rock pigeon, partridge pigeon (red eyed form), and rufous-throated honeyeater. Enjoy a rewarding sunset

cruise on the Yellow Waters Billabong, Kakadu's best-known wetland. This impressive wetland of channels, swamps, and floodplains is a delight to explore and is home to crocodiles and a variety of waterbirds including nankeen night-heron, black-necked stork, little kingfisher, and purple swamphen. Raptors such as white-bellied sea-eagle, whistling, and black kites are also commonly seen here, as well as plenty of crocodiles in the water and on the banks.

Sep 27 ~ Nourlangie Rock and drive to Darwin

Make an early visit to Nourlangie Rock where you have a reasonable chance of seeing the range-restricted black wallaroo, banded fruit-dove, white-lined honeyeater, little woodswallow, black-tailed treecreeper, and helmeted friarbird. You will then enjoy a last look around Kakadu before making your way out of the park and heading back to Darwin. On the way back you will visit Howard Springs Nature Park where large fish such as (delicious!) barramundi and reptiles like yellow-faced turtle can be easily viewed, you will also search for the elusive rainbow pitta. You will return to Darwin in the late afternoon.

Sep 28 ~ Fly to Cairns for wetlands

If time allows, before your flight to Cairns this morning, you will take an opportunity to visit a few local parks and beaches around the Darwin area before heading to the airport. Upon your arrival in Cairns, you will transfer to your hotel on the Esplanade overlooking the Coral Sea. There will be an option of visiting the intertidal sand flats, which are famous for migratory waders, and nearby mangroves to see a variety of birds like mangrove robin, shining flycatcher, and beach stone-curlew.

Sep 29 ~ Drive to Atherton Tablelands

Today you will leave coastal Cairns and make your way to the Atherton Tablelands, stopping at several sites on the way. In areas of farmland you may see brolga and sarus crane. In the afternoon, you will arrive at your accommodation for the next two nights. The lodge, set in lush rainforest brimming with birds and wildlife, is adjacent to Crater Lake National Park, and is a fantastic base from which to explore the riches of the area. The lodge grounds are home to an abundance of birdlife including wompoo and superb fruit dove, spotted catbird, tooth-billed bowerbird, white-throated treecreeper, Macleay's and bridled honeyeater, yellow-breasted boatbill, and Victoria's riflebird (a member of the Bird of Paradise family). Several mammals may also be seen here in the evening including long-nosed bandicoot, sugar glider, northern striped possum, and red-legged pademelon.

Sep 30 ~ Atherton Tablelands, Crater Lakes National Park

Explore the tapestry of farmland, woodland, and rainforest for a wonderful cross-section of wildlife, which will include several national parks: Crater Lakes National Park (comprising 2 volcanic lakes: Lake Barrine and Lake Eacham), Mt. Hypipamee National Park and Curtain Fig National Park. You will search for a range of bird species, including several bowerbirds, Victoria's riflebird and chowchillas and most importantly, southern cassowary! There will also be an opportunity to take an evening tour in search of more of the range-restricted endemic mammals in the area which include green, lemuroid, and Herbert River ringtail possums, coppery-tailed possums as well as Lumholtz's tree kangaroo. You may also see platypus!

Oct 1 ~ Granite Gorge and then to the Daintree

This morning you will travel northwards, stopping en route at some wetlands where a multitude of waterbirds may be seen. You will also visit Granite Gorge where you may enjoy encounters with squatter pigeon, and the Mareeba rock wallaby. Additional species you may see on your journey today include red-winged parrot, red-tailed black-cockatoo, and Australian bustard which prefer the dry savannah country in this region, and which makes a stark contrast to the rainforest areas of the Tablelands and the coast. In the late afternoon, you will arrive at your accommodation set on the banks of the fabled Daintree River.

Oct 2 ~ Cruise the Daintree River and back to Cairns

Enjoy an early morning boat cruise on the Daintree River where you may enjoy sightings of azure and little kingfisher, large-billed gerygone, varied triller, shining flycatcher and fairy martin, as well as a chance of the rare & localised great-billed heron. Additional species you may see in the area include bar-shouldered dove, Pacific koel, Papuan frogmouth, scaly-breasted lorikeet, helmeted friarbird, dusky myzomela and white-breasted woodswallow. You will then make your way back to Cairns where you will spend the afternoon visiting the Botanic Gardens and adjoining wetlands and conservation areas which offer a fine mix of water and bush birds. Australian brush turkey, orange-footed scrubfowl, Australasian figbird, black butcherbird, green oriole, the stunning noisy pitta, and lovely fairy-wren may all be seen here as might spectacled flying fox. In the wetlands you will search for comb-crested jacana, radjah shelduck, green pygmy geese, white-browed crane, and the handsome crimson finch.

Oct 3 ~ Snorkel the Great Barrier Reef - Michaelmas Cay

Today, you will transfer to the Cairns wharf to start your day trip to the Great Barrier Reef. You will cruise towards stunning Michaelmas Cay which is situated on the Outer reef about 25mi offshore from Cairns. This coral cay is an important nesting area for an array of tropical seabirds, including brown booby, sooty, bridled and black-naped tern, common and black noddy, lesser frigatebird, Pacific golden plover, and ruddy turnstone. More uncommonly masked booby, wandering tattler, roseate tern, and great frigatebird are seen. The cay is also surrounded by tropical coral reef where you will have the opportunity to snorkel. You will return to your hotel late in the afternoon and enjoy a farewell dinner, but no farewells are necessary if you join our Southern Australia trip (<https://cheesemans.com/trips/southern-australia-oct2022>).

Oct 4 ~ Join our Southern Australia trip or fly home

Transfer to Cairns airport after breakfast at the hotel. Continue on our Southern Australian trip (<https://cheesemans.com/trips/southern-australia-oct2022>) or fly home.

- Snorkeling equipment (mask, snorkel, and fins) for day at Great Barrier Reef.

Not Included

- All airfare, airport and departure taxes, and excess baggage fees. Airfare is approximately \$1,400 to \$2,000 from the US to Uluru, Australia, and back to the US from Cairns, depending on origin, plus approximately \$450 for two internal flights. **If continuing on our Southern Australia trip**, approximately \$200 for the one-way flight from Cairns to Brisbane.
- Passport and visa fees.
- Airport transfers in addition to the included group transfer on October 4.
- We can arrange extra hotel nights for an additional cost.
- Optional helicopter flight at Kings Canyon.
- Gratuities – tipping is always discretionary. However, we suggest budgeting about \$10 to \$15 per participant per day for September 20 to October 4 with your local guides (about \$150 to \$225 total per participant).
- Wetsuits for day at Great Barrier Reef. We will send you more details about rentals in the Trip Materials.

OTHER DETAILS

Climate

Temperatures vary depending on the location. Lows can be about 48 to 71°F (8 to 21°C) and highs can be about 78 to 89°F (25 to 31°C). Although it is the dry season, rain and thunderstorms are still possible.

Fitness Level

You need to be able to get in and out of the vehicle and boats on Daintree River, Yellow Waters, and Great Barrier Reef cruise. You'll take short walks during stops while driving between destinations. You'll take longer walks at Watarrka on uneven ground, but if you prefer shorter walks, we will make them available. Snorkeling is optional on the Great Barrier Reef cruise. Please contact us if you have any health concerns that may make this trip challenging.

Seasickness

Don't let a fear of seasickness scare you away! We have three boat trips on this trip, so it's a good idea to bring medication if you get seasick or are unsure. Read our suggestions for coping with seasickness at www.cheesemans.com/seasickness and contact us if you have any concerns.
