SAFARI OVERVIEW

Join us for this unforgettable small-group wildlife expedition through Southern Australia, exploring the pristine landscapes of Tasmania and Queensland. Traverse the rugged terrain of Cradle Mountain, discover the lush, untouched rainforests of Mount Field National Park, and experience the rich biodiversity of Bruny Island, home to rare endemic birds and breathtaking coastal scenery. On guided night excursions, observe Tasmania's remarkable nocturnal wildlife, including Eastern Quolls, Little Penguins, and the elusive Tasmanian Devil, then wander through tranquil forest reserves and along crystal-clear streams ideal for spotting platypus in their natural habitat, before visiting Narawntapu National Park for close-up encounters with wombats, wallabies, and pademelons. In Queensland, explore the World Heritage-listed Lamington National Park, where colorful parrots, lyrebirds, and marsupials abound, and watch for vibrant species such as the charming Superb Fairy-wren and the striking Paradise Riflebird. Designed for wildlife enthusiasts and photographers, this intimate adventure offers unparalleled access to Australia's iconic landscapes and extraordinary wildlife.

DETAILED ITINERARY

Oct 17–18 ~ Travel to Hobart, Tasmania from home.

Begin your journey to Southern Australia, arriving in Hobart, Tasmania, the gateway to some of the most biodiverse landscapes in Australia.

Oct 19 ~ Arrival & Exploration of Hobart Reserves

Today you will begin your exploration of Tasmania with visits to several reserves around Hobart, including Kunanyi/Mount Wellington. On clear days, the summit offers sweeping views across Hobart and the surrounding landscapes. You will also enjoy a walk through a fern-filled glade with towering tree ferns, where you may have your first opportunity to spot the endemic and elusive Scrubtit, along with Tasmanian Scrubwren and the striking Pink Robin. Other endemic highlights you will be on the lookout for include Green Rosella, Tasmanian Native Hen, Black Currawong, and Yellow Wattlebird.

Oct 20 ~ Hobart to Bruny Island

This morning you will travel to Bruny Island, located 40 km south of Hobart and separated from the Tasmanian mainland by the D'Entrecasteaux Channel. The ferry crossing takes approximately 15 minutes, and on occasion, Little Penguins or dolphins can be seen alongside. Your first stop will be Inala, a privately owned 1,500-acre wildlife sanctuary that is home to all 12 Tasmanian endemic bird species, including one of the largest known colonies of the endangered Forty-spotted Pardalote. Regular visitors to the sanctuary include Strong-billed, Yellow-throated, and Black-headed Honeyeaters, Dusky Robin, and Green Rosella. Several hides and observation platforms provide excellent close-up views of some very special species, including a variety of raptors. With luck, you may even encounter the striking white morph Grey Goshawks that reside here. Mammal highlights at Inala typically include Red-necked (Bennett's) Wallaby and Tasmanian Pademelon. You will also have the opportunity to appreciate the fascinating flora of the area, including endemic Tasmanian species and relics dating back to the ancient Gondwanan supercontinent.

In the afternoon, you will explore Bruny Island's southern coastline, visiting the second oldest lighthouse in Australia and searching for species such as Tawny-crowned Honeyeater, Olive Whistler, and Yellow-tailed Black-Cockatoo. There is also a chance to encounter the Tasmanian subspecies of Short-beaked Echidna.

After dinner, you will visit a Short-tailed Shearwater colony—and occasionally Little Penguins—to observe these birds at their burrows as night falls.

Oct 21 ~ Bruny Island Marine Safari & Seabird Viewing

This morning, after breakfast, you will join a wilderness cruise along Bruny's southern coastline, offering spectacular coastal scenery and a visit to an Australian fur seal haul-out (weather permitting). The cruise also provides the opportunity to see a variety of seabirds, including albatross (with Shy Albatross being the most common), Black-faced Cormorants, and possibly Common Diving-petrels. You may also encounter cetaceans such as bottlenose and common dolphins, as well as humpback and Southern right whales.

In the afternoon, you will have the chance to explore historic and scenically beautiful Adventure Bay. There may be opportunities for beach walks where Hooded Plovers could be seen, and you will visit a cool temperate rainforest. You will also search for Bruny's rare and famous "white wallabies," an almost albino genetic variation of Bennett's wallaby.

Tonight, you will enjoy another guided nocturnal outing, offering the chance to see a variety of Tasmania's nocturnal marsupials, including Tasmanian pademelons, Eastern quolls (a relative of the Tasmanian devil), Bennett's wallabies, and brush-tailed possums, which occasionally occur in a rare golden color form. There is also a good chance of spotting long-nosed potoroo.

Oct 22 ~ Mount Field National Park

This morning, you will depart Bruny Island and travel to Mount Field National Park. The park offers a remarkable variety of habitats, from fern-filled gullies with waterfalls to alpine heathland and cool temperate rainforest, home to some of the tallest Eucalyptus trees in Australia. Today, you will have a good chance of seeing the unique platypus, one of Australia's fascinating monotremes.

In the late afternoon, you will leave the park and make your way to a nearby farm-stay accommodation, where you will spend the night.

Oct 23–24 ~ Cradle Mountain

In the morning, you will leave the Mount Field area and travel toward the Cradle Mountain region, stopping along the way at points of interest. You will arrive at your accommodation near the National Park in the late afternoon. You will have a full day to explore the Cradle Mountain area, searching for Tasmania’s endemic bird species such as the Black Currawong, which is common at higher altitudes. This area is also a good place to spot common wombats. You will have the opportunity to enjoy the unique plant life here, including ancient rainforest species and Gondwanan relics such as Pencil Pines, King Billy Pines, Myrtle, and the famous Fagus (*Nothofagus gunnii*), Tasmania’s only deciduous tree. You will also visit the replica of “Waldheim,” the home of Austrian Gustav Weindorfer, whose love of the region inspired the establishment of the national park. Tonight, you will venture back into the National Park in search of nocturnal wildlife, including Tasmanian devils and spotted-tailed quolls.

Oct 25 ~ Cradle Mountain to northern Tasmanian coast

This morning, you will visit a wildlife sanctuary where some of Tasmania’s rarer mammal species can be seen up close, including Tasmanian Devils, quolls, and wombats. You will then travel to a reserve that offers another excellent chance of spotting platypus before continuing to Narawntapu National Park. Narawntapu was established as a refuge for the Tasmanian form of the Eastern grey kangaroo, known locally as the Forester kangaroo, which can often be seen grazing in the late afternoon. The park also features impressive marsupial lawns, well-grazed areas frequented by marsupials, that support some of the highest densities of Tasmanian pademelons and red-necked wallabies in Tasmania, earning it the nickname “the Serengeti of Tasmania.” You will then travel to your B&B at nearby Hawley Beach, where you will enjoy a gourmet, home-cooked farewell dinner. After dinner, there will be an optional night walk in search of Southern brown bandicoot and long-nosed potoroo.

Oct 26–28 ~ Lamington National Park

Fly to Queensland and immerse yourself in the World Heritage-listed rainforests of Lamington National Park, one of Australia’s premier birding destinations. Explore towering subtropical forests, lush fern gullies, and misty waterfalls, home to over 200 bird species, including the striking Paradise Riflebird, Albert’s Lyrebird, and Regent Bowerbird. Walk beneath ancient fig trees while watching for Australian Brush-turkeys, Noisy Pittas,

and Logrunners. In the evenings, join guided night walks where you may encounter greater gliders, ringtail possums, and sugar gliders moving through the canopy.

Oct 29 ~ Depart for home

Enjoy a final morning walk through Lamington’s pristine rainforests, where early risers may be rewarded with sightings of the Superb Fairy-wren, Wonga Pigeon, and red-legged pademelon. After breakfast, transfer to Brisbane Airport, concluding your Southern Australia wildlife expedition.

Oct 30 ~ Arrive home

Return home with lasting memories of Australia’s unique wildlife, dramatic landscapes, and unforgettable wildlife encounters.

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OTHER DETAILS

Climate

Weather conditions will vary throughout the itinerary due to changes in latitude, elevation, and proximity to the coast. In Tasmania, including Hobart, Bruny Island, Mount Field, and Cradle Mountain, temperatures are often cool, especially in the mornings and evenings, with lows ranging from about 29 to 45°F (-1 to 7°C) and daytime highs generally between 55 and 70°F (13 to 21°C). Highland areas such as Cradle Mountain can be colder, windier, and subject to rapid weather changes, while coastal locations may feel cool and breezy, particularly during boat excursions. In Queensland's Lamington National Park, conditions are warmer and more humid, with lows around 50 to 55°F (10 to 12°C) and highs of 70 to 75°F (21 to 23°C). Rain is possible at any point during the trip, especially in temperate and subtropical rainforest areas.

Fitness Level

This itinerary is best suited for travelers with a **moderate fitness level** who are comfortable with regular walking and being outdoors for extended periods. Most activities involve leisurely to moderate-paced walks on

well-maintained trails, boardwalks, beaches, and uneven natural terrain, typically lasting one to three hours at a time, with plenty of stops for wildlife viewing and photography. There are no strenuous hikes or steep, sustained climbs required, though some areas such as Mount Field, Cradle Mountain, and Lamington National Park may include uneven ground, gentle inclines, steps, or muddy sections. Several nocturnal outings and full days of exploration mean long but rewarding days, so a reasonable level of stamina and balance is important. Overall, this is an active yet accessible wildlife-focused journey, ideal for travelers who enjoy nature walks and don't mind varied terrain, but it does not require advanced hiking experience.
