SAFARI OVERVIEW

Embark on an unforgettable ship-based expedition through northern Norway, where Arctic magic comes alive. This journey offers the chance to witness the mesmerizing northern lights dancing across polar skies and observe orcas and humpback whales feeding in the fjords—one of nature's most powerful spectacles. As conditions allow, venture ashore for exhilarating winter adventures to feel the rush of snowmobiling across Arctic terrain and explore the stark beauty of the north on foot with guided hikes. Capture once-in-a-lifetime wildlife photography as you cruise through prime whale-watching locations. Each day's itinerary adapts to the weather and sea conditions, ensuring a flexible and immersive experience that embraces the wild, ever-changing rhythms of the high north.

- **Orca & Humpback Whale Watching in Arctic Waters:** Watch these magnificent marine mammals feed on herring in the fjords.

Originally from Brittany, France, Lizza built her early career around ocean conservation and marine mammal research, including cetacean bioacoustic studies and sea excursions in the Iroise Sea. After moving to the Alps, she discovered a passion for ornithology and alpine wildlife, eventually becoming a certified mountain guide. Today, she divides her time between sea and mountains, working as a cetologist guide on cruises in Norway and the Mediterranean while also leading mountain excursions year-round, sharing her deep knowledge of wildlife along the way.

SHIP

We've selected the most well-equipped and comfortable vessel in its class for this expedition. Designed specifically for small group polar exploration, the ship features an ice-strengthened hull and shallow draft, allowing it to navigate narrow channels and remote inlets that are inaccessible to larger vessels. You'll enjoy intimate wildlife encounters and scenic cruising from a fleet of Zodiacs used for shore landings and water-level photography. The ship also offers a spacious dual-level observation deck at the bow and large viewing windows in the lounge and dining areas—perfect for wildlife watching and enjoying the dramatic Arctic landscapes. Onboard, the comfortable lounge serves as a hub for relaxing, reviewing photos, and joining naturalist-led lectures and discussions. Accommodations include private cabins on the lower deck (or shared main deck cabins), all with en-suite bathrooms. With a maximum of just twelve passengers, this vessel provides an exclusive and immersive experience, allowing us to explore remote places that larger ships simply can't reach. DETAILED ITINERARY

Nov 11–12 ~ Travel to and arrive in Tromsø, Norway

Your Arctic adventure begins with a flight to Tromsø, Norway, often called the capital of the Arctic Circle and once known as the Paris of the North. Ringed by snow-dusted peaks and dramatic fjords, this lively city is

famous for its northern lights viewing and deep polar heritage. Arrive by November 11, giving yourself an overnight in town before boarding the ship the next day.

Nov 13 ~ Embark on our ship

Spend a relaxed morning wandering Tromsø, taking in the harbor, the striking Arctic Cathedral, and the local markets. You'll meet your expedition leader in the late afternoon before transferring to the port to board your small expedition ship this evening. Once you've settled into your cabin, we embark into the fjords of Arctic Norway and the expedition officially begins. Compared to Antarctic waters, this region tends to be notably calmer. Over the course of this expedition, you'll have plenty of chances for Zodiac excursions, shore landings, hikes, winter activities, and wildlife viewing right from the ship's decks.

Nov 14–19 ~ Voyage through and explore Norway's Arctic waters, fjords, and coastlines

For six days, we'll navigate Norway's remote fjords and coastal waters, observing orcas and humpback whales as they hunt herring in massive feeding swarms. These encounters can bring you within meters of whales working together in coordinated pursuit — a truly striking sight from the Zodiac.

Days will blend wildlife sightings, guided excursions, and photography instruction from our onboard naturalist. The Arctic's low winter sun paints the icy terrain in warm gold tones, ideal for capturing dramatic images. Once evening arrives, head up to the ship's two-tier observation deck, or step ashore, to watch the aurora borealis ripple across the sky in shades of green, blue, and violet.

Beyond whale watching, the region offers plenty of ways to experience Arctic life firsthand:

- **Snowmobiling adventure** – Ride through backcountry trails and snow-blanketed terrain, taking in views found nowhere else.
- **Traditional sauna experience** – Warm up the Nordic way with a steaming sauna session after a day out in the cold.
- **Visit remote fishing villages** – Go ashore in small, isolated communities to learn about Sami heritage and generations-old fishing customs.

As with any expedition, our route stays flexible and responsive to weather, sea state, and ice conditions. Wildlife sightings, whales in particular, along with the region's dramatic scenery, guide our daily plans, always within Norway's wildlife protection guidelines. Because our group is small, we can linger wherever the action is

best, giving photographers time to wait for that perfect shot. Activities like snowmobiling are optional; if you'd rather sit one out, just let us know ahead of time so we can plan accordingly.

Nov 20 ~ Disembark and flights homeward

We return to Tromsø, marking the close of your Arctic voyage. After breakfast, you'll disembark and transfer to the airport for your flight home or onward journey.

Nov 21 ~ Arrive home

Touch down at home with a head full of memories — Arctic wildlife, dramatic landscapes, and the glow of the northern lights.

OTHER DETAILS

Climate

You will visit the Arctic at the beginning stages of the polar night season. Due to high mountain ranges, you

may not see the sun rise at all as it sits just at or below the horizon line, but there are still a few hours of beautiful pink and golden light that give subtle twilight light. Expect temperatures in the upper 20s°F (-2°C) at night and mid 30s°F (2°C) during the day. Skies are usually variable with a mix of clear and cloudy days. Weather patterns can be highly variable, so bring appropriate gear to handle a mix of conditions including wind, snow, and rain.

Fitness Level

You must be able to get in and out of the Zodiacs from the ship, via a short four-foot rope ladder with wooden rungs spaced about a foot apart, with staff assisting above you from the ship and below you on the Zodiac. Some upper body strength and coordination is required. Once ashore, you must also be able to get in and out of the Zodiacs onto the beach. You'll have opportunities for a range of activities from easy, short hikes to longer, more vigorous hikes and activities for those interested. There are various roads and trails along the coasts and villages and most terrain is not too technical, however spikes, winter boots, and poles are recommended, and snow depth can affect the level of difficulty. Most walks are less than a mile and often loop. Please contact us if you have any health concerns that may make this trip challenging.

Accommodations

Land accommodations are not included in the trip cost, and you are welcome to stay at any hotel in the area. This allows for maximum flexibility and freedom of choice in your arrival to Tromsø. We will provide you a list of recommended hotels in your Trip Planning Materials that offer a mix of good value, comfort, and ideal location close to the meet-up location on embarkation day.

Motion Sickness

Don't let a fear of motion sickness keep you away! For all but the most sensitive, seasickness is rarely a problem in this region. It's a good idea to bring medication if you get seasick or are unsure, but you may find that you do not need it after a couple days once you have your "sea legs." Even those who have experienced seasickness reported that the incredible wildlife and overall experience were well worth the temporary discomfort. If you are susceptible to seasickness or are concerned that you might be, please come prepared! The key to avoiding seasickness is to act before you experience nausea. Do your own research and consult your doctor before taking any medications. A good night of sleep, eating well, limiting alcohol, and using your favorite seasickness remedy is sufficient for most travelers. FAQS

Why travel on a small ship?

With just twelve passenger cabins, our ship is significantly smaller than most cruise vessels in Norway, giving us the ability to access narrow inlets and more remote areas. Traveling with a small group allows for greater flexibility, more intimate wildlife encounters, and personalized attention throughout the journey.

Are we guaranteed to see the northern lights?

While we can't guarantee sightings of the northern lights, as they depend on natural conditions beyond our control, being in the right place at the right time significantly improves your chances. Our flexible itinerary allows the ship to adjust course in search of the best nighttime viewing locations. Northern Norway, especially in late November, offers excellent opportunities to witness this awe-inspiring natural phenomenon, and the Arctic region is considered one of the best places in the world to see the aurora borealis.

There are also forecasts available and the Kp Index is considered the most reliable. Measured on a scale of 0 to 9 with 0 indicating low auroral activity and 9 being extremely high, the Geophysical Institute of the University of Alaska-Fairbanks offers a [website](#) to view auroral activity and up to 27 day forecasts in all the auroral regions of the world, including Europe and the areas of Norway in which you will be.

How do I photograph the northern lights?

Capturing the aurora involves a bit of trial and error. Keep in mind that no two aurora displays are the same—each night brings different conditions and variables, which means your camera settings may need to change accordingly. A mindset of curiosity, flexibility, and enjoyment will go a long way in making the experience both successful and memorable.
